The pilgrims were a group of people who left Europe to start a new life here in America. After a long journey on the Mayflower the first pilgrims landed in Massachusetts in the winter of 1620. 





Wampanoag Clothing

The Wampanoag wore very little clothing compared to the pilgrims. Their clothes were primarily made from animals. They often went barefoot or sometimes they would wear moccasins made from deerskin.

The men often wore only loincloths made from deerskins. They carried a pouch for food or supplies. The men also had clothes for special occasions which included deerskin pants and a tribal headdress made with feathers.

The women wore deerskin dresses. They made jewelry from stones, bones and shells.

Pilgrim Clothing


The pilgrims wore many layers of clothing. The girls wore petticoats, skirts, blouses, coats, boots, and stockings tied with garters. They also wore a coif on their heads and an apron. Around her waist she would tie a small sack called a pocket (pockets were not sewn into clothes back then).

The boys wore breeches, stockings, garters and boots. They wore a short coat called a doublet. A boys breeches were laced up around the waist and tied on each day.

There were no sewing machines so the clothes were made by hand and colored with things the pilgrims found in the New World (plants, animals, minerals).
