Question 1:

Why did you become a School Social Worker in the Yonkers Public Schools?

I returned home to Yonkers Public Schools as a Social Worker in mid-2019 in the midst of the Covid-19 pandemic, after being offered an opportunity to return the school district that I started my Social Work Career back in the early-mid 2000's. I was originally employed as a Social Worker at PEALRS Hawthorne School where I completed my School Administrator Supervision internship . Yonkers Schools Social Workers and Student Support Staff embody a true self-less dedication to our Yonkers students and families. Upon my return I immediately experienced that sense of love, respect, and collaboration.

Ouestion 2:

What does My Brother's Keeper mean to you?

MBK embodies adult mentorship and modelling of daily life's challenges in the lives of our young male students in the City of Yonkers. MBK allows opportunities for elementary, middle, and high school boys of color to experience genuine human connections with mentors within their respective schools. Those connections are the foundations for self-reflection, selfcorrection, self-motivation, renewed purpose, and often times live saving choices for our boys or young men. Since my involvement in MBK on the secondary school level at Lincoln High School and during our past three Summer School sessions, I have attempted to make an impact in the form of modelling appropriate behaviors, challenging selfdestructive thought patterns, shattering negative stereotypes, fostering accountability, and developing adolescent life skills. Those life skills have been in the form of pre-employment skills, employment application opportunities, financial literacy workshops, substance use prevention, and engaging with local law enforcement to reduce negative stereotypes or adverse experiences. Most importantly, MBK has allowed me to impact the lives of young men of color in generating hope, self-determination, and live path trajectory changes one student at a time.

Question 3:

What advice would you have for new Yonkers staff working in local MBK school chapters?

Advice that I would respectfully give to any new Yonkers Public Schools staff embarking on an MBK Mentoring journey would be to first ask or self-reflect on the question of how can I genuinely and positively affect the lives of young boys or young men? Additionally, I would then recommend learning the history of the MBK Alliance and off course the history of MBK Yonkers since the inception in 2016. Finally, I would recommend that you examine the six fundamental MBK Milestones as laid out in the MBK Yonkers Action Plan. Then begin to critically examine how you and the MBK School Committee can create a school-specific action plan throughout the year with monthly steps/measures to achieve at least one of those six milestones that apply to your specific school or age group of boys for the school year.

- Milestone One: Entering School Ready to Learn
- Milestone Two: Reading at Grade Level by 3rd Grade
- Milestone Three: Graduating from High School
- Milestone Four: Completing Post-Secondary Education or Training
- Milestone Five: Successfully Employed
- Milestone Six: All Youth Remain Safe from Violent Crime

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I will encourage my brother to achieve his dreams and to never compromise his values.

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MBK MILESTONE KEY PRINCIPLES

The earliest years of a child's life are critical for building the foundation for success in school and beyond. During these years, children's brains develop rapidly, influenced heavily by their experiences.

MILESTONE #3: GRADUATE FROM HIGH SCHOOL

A data system that tracks the allocation of resources across schools can highlight disparities and opportunity gaps for students in your community.

MILESTONE #5: ALL YOUTH OUT OF SCHOOL ARE EMPLOYED

Employers in high-demand sectors can reduce training costs by working with post-secondary education institutions to ensure their curriculum prepares students to be work-ready from day one of employment.

MILESTONE #2: READING AT GRADE LEVEL BY THIRD GRADE

To thrive, all children must receive high-quality, evidence informed, and continuous support for active learning. To ensure that we move the needle on child outcomes and the quality of instruction in the classroom, we must invest in support for intensive and effective professional development to early educators responsible for the education of young children.

MILESTONE #4: COMPLETE POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION OR TRAINING

Cities that are globally competitive attract businesses and families when more residents pursue and successfully obtain post-secondary degrees and credentials.

MILESTONE #6: ALL YOUTH REMAIN SAFE FROM VIOLENT CRIME


MBK ONEDRIVE ACCOUNT




