


YONKERS STUDENTS TODAY: 29,594

24,049 Students attend 39 public schools & Community-Based Organizations:

- 22,726 Kindergarten to Grade Twelve Students

 - 16,309 Economically Disadvantaged (68%)
 - 4,625 Students with Disabilities (19%)
 - 3,208 Multilingual Learners (13%)
 - 15,006 Hispanic (62%)
 - 3,766 African American/Black (16%)
 - 5,295 White, Asian/Pacific Islander, American Indian, Multi-Racial (22%)

Accomplishments - Grant Support

- Awarded \$2,000,000 for the RECOVS *Learning Loss Grant*, to support academic recovery in both Math and ELA in grades K-8 in the Enrico Fermi School, Cross Hill Academy, Museum 25, School 23, Barack Obama School for Social Justice to strengthen our district-wide MTSS structures
- Awarded \$2,000,000 for the RECOVS Social-Emotional Learning Loss Grant to support mental health initiatives in the Enrico Fermi School, Cesar E. Chavez School, Casimir Pulaski School, Paideia School 15 to strengthen our PBIS and classroom level interventional structures
- Awarded \$3,600,000 for the Stronger Connections Grant, focused on establishing safe, healthy and supportive learning environments for high needs students, through the prevention of, and response to, acts of bullying, violence, and hate impacting our school communities. The participating schools are the Justice Sonia Sotomayor Community School, Las Hermanas Mirabal Community School, Yonkers High School, Maria Eugenio de Hostos Micro-society School and Pearls Hawthorne
- Redesigned and increased teacher participation in the Connect Kids Grant, providing more opportunities for students to visit Philipse Manor Hall and the Old Croton Aqueduct

Accomplishments - Curricula

- Rollout of new K-8 Science Curriculum across all 32 buildings
- Collaboration with Houghton Mifflin Harcourt:
 - Enhanced and personalized the professional development for teachers
 - o Increased quality and shifted to the content of associated teacher training
- The Project for Education Research That Scales (PERTS): Collaborative case study between YPS
 and Bank Street College to produce positive outcomes in Math, for Black and Latino middle school as
 well as students experiencing poverty
 - 23 middle schools significant progress increasing the percentage of these students who
 reported receiving strong feedback for growth in their Math classes
- Roll-out of new curriculum for 7-12 Health Education
 - First digital curriculum in Health Education, featuring student selection of content and language
 - Ensures inclusivity and encourages active student engagement

Accomplishments - P.D.

- Partnered with Mercy University and Math in the City (CUNY) to provide 24 teachers in grades 3-5 professional learning to support their content knowledge and level of comfort in teaching Math
- Launched i-Ready Classroom Mathematics curriculum in all K-8 classrooms, creating vertically and horizontally aligned instructional materials, and embedding pedagogical practices
 - Mid-year diagnostic data indicated that students performing on or above grade-level (K-8) has increased by 13% and students performing two or more grade-levels below (K-8) has decreased by 11%
- Executive Director of Mathematics presented at the January 8th Board of Regents meeting, regarding the innovative practices in mathematics instruction, implemented in the District

Accomplishments - MBK

- One of four cities in the country recognized by President Barack Obama for its success in implementing the My Brother's Keeper (MBK) Program
- Recognized as an MBK Model Community
- Tasked with creating and executing 5-year goals to achieve six milestones:
 - Milestone 1 (Entering School Ready to Learn)
 - Milestone 2 (Reading at Grade Level by 3rd grade)
 - Milestone 3 (Graduate from High School)
 - Milestone 4 (Complete Post-Secondary Education or Training)
 - Milestone 5 (All youth out of school are employed)
 - Milestone 6 (All youth remain safe from violent crime)
- Presenting to Foundation leadership, and other Model Community programs, on strategies employed, and journey traveled, to achieve population level impact regarding Milestone 3

Accomplishments - Sports

- First unified sports program within the Yonkers Public Schools District
 - Inclusive Sports provides students with intellectual disabilities the opportunity to train and compete in a variety of sports alongside their non-disabled peers
 - Project Unity promotes social inclusion, friendship and understanding among diverse scholar athletes, through participation in shared experiences
 - Provides opportunities for scholar athletes to assume leadership roles in promoting Project Unity activities in their learning communities
- Installation of HUDL cameras at 11 locations, with two portable cameras:
 - Coaches can access additional tools to assist scholar-athletes growth and improve performance
 - HUDL provides ability for scholar-athletes to create recruiting profiles, that can assist them in developing video portfolios for recruiters/colleges
 - Eliminate barriers for families and local community members
 - Interscholastic athletic program games can now be streamed and viewed by families and community members from any connected device
- Rollout of E-Sports Program across six high schools and eight middle schools
 - Competitive and engaging afterschool program to compete in skill-based games and tournaments

Accomplishments – School Opening

- Justice Sonia Sotomayor Community School state of the art design, when fully operational: Pre-K-8th grade
 - Dual Language Goal: Students will speak fluently in English and Spanish, read and write with proficiency in both languages
 - Journey to earn the NYS Seal of Biliteracy
 - o Bilingual, biliterate and bicultural students
 - Inclusive learning environment where social justice is not just an idea, but a way of life (general education, special education, students with interrupted formal education-SIFE)
 - Empowered to embrace their cultural heritage, develop multilingual proficiency, express themselves creatively and become active citizens in a multicultural world
 - On-site Family Center and Clinic offering medical and mental health services

Accomplishments – School Opening

- Yonkers Film and Television Production Academy (temporary name) when fully operational: grades 6th -12th school – Partnership Great Point Studios
- Careers in the film and entertainment fields through industry-aligned projects, professional internships and collaboration with industry partners
 - Pre-apprenticeship training and Career & Technical Education (CTE) experiences through a Career Academy Model: Production & Design, Production
 Management & Performance and Sound Design
 - Interdisciplinary industry-aligned STEAM-integrated project-based learning opportunities (A.P./College Link)
 - NYS Next Generation Learning Standards extended projects spanning core subject areas, culminating in performances shared with the greater learning community
 - New York State Individual Arts 4+1 Assessment Pathway, where students will complete an arts portfolio instead of a fifth Regents Exam

Accomplishments – SEL SUPPORT

- Revamped the Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS) to provide targeted support for all learners
 Tiered model academic, behavioral and social-emotional services
 - School-Based Supports: Core Support Team: incorporate trauma-sensitive strategies into daily instructional and social interactions and survey learning community regarding school climate
 - <u>District Supports</u>: Regional Support Team: Social Worker, Psychologist, Speech Therapist, Case Manager deployed to school panels
 - o Specialized SEL Interventions:
 - Created several restorative room spaces through the McKinney Vento Grant
 - o Rooms were conceptually predicated on a person-in-environment healing model
 - Designed with evidence-based practice approaches that include sensory stimulation through soft lighting, aromatherapy diffusers, auditory relaxation devices, soft and accessible materials and a lush, but meditative, naturalist aesthetic






