

### LINCOLN HIGH SCHOOL CURRENT EVENTS AND TRENDS




## Lincoln Lancers Then

THIS IS THE LINCOLN LANCERS MASCOT FROM THE 1970S


#### Auditorium

Two years ago, major construction was finished on Lincoln's auditorium into what we know it as today. It was able to be done because in 2020, four years ago, Yonkers was awarded a grant that went to Lincoln and Yonkers Middle High School. The total amount granted between the two schools was \$750,000, but Lincoln itself was awarded \$250,000, which they used to install air conditioning, as well as refurbish the stage floor and install a new video projections screen. After it's finalization, it is now considered the largest venue with air conditioning and other amenities.



#### Lincoln and segregation history

While Lincoln High School is now the home to an incredibly diverse group of children, this wasn't always the case. Up until 1986, Lincoln High School was one of the multiple schools in Yonkers affected by the standing segregation of the city. Before the desegregation, Lincoln high school was a predominantly white school with few exceptions. Now it a school in which many different cultures are celebrated year-round.




Sports






The returning players on the team hope to continue their winning ways. Their goal in the "77 season was to win the Sectional Championship.









- JROTC (Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps) was a big organization in Lincoln history.

ROTC at the Yankees stadium






Arts had a much larger following in Lincoln than it does today. Choir groups took up monumental space, we hosted parades that thousands came to watch, we held fashion shows, we offered dance classes, and had a much wider selection of performing arts.

Now Arts is still a large part of Lincoln, but with a lot of changes. Choir groups still perform a lot and is run by Mr. Zion. Parades with the marching band is still held but is district wide (The instrumental music teacher for LHS is currently Ms. Packes). Fashion is no longer a part of lincoln, and dance classes are no longer offered. The LHS dance group is self-run now, meaning all performances are choreographed and prepared for by the students alone.









#### MAGNET AND BRANCHES

- ▶ In Lincoln history, teachers with seniority recall upon the many different magnets that have been dropped as time reached on as budget cuts were made. Pre-teaching was a magnet no longer available in Lincoln today.
- ► Currently, Lincoln High School has three magnets that children can participate in, these include the academy of arts, the academy of finance, and the academy of scientific research.
- Upon the entrance to each academy, one has the option to join classes according to what you are choosing to study, such as woodshop, theater, scientific research, principals of finance, and financial management.

#### CLUBS (FROM THEN)

- In Lincoln past Clubs were not really a big part of the extracurriculars.

  Mainly sports was what Lincoln held dear, but there was a few clubs that Lincoln had, though not extremely popular.
- Clubs included: S.A.D.D.(Students Against Destructive Decisions), Students General Organization, Moto-Cross, P.T.S.A (Parent Teacher Student Association), and Cheerleading.




#### CLUBS (FROM NOW)

#### 1. Junior ring ceremony



Lincon High School used to offer what was known as a Junior ring ceremony. This included the juniors of Lincoln high school being awarded for their transition into their new life as seniors. This used to be a longstanding event at our school and was eventually disbanded.

#### 2. Faculty show



Lincoln high school, similar to its current situation, used to hold fundraisers for its magnet programs. One of these fundraisers was known as the Faculty show in which teachers and administration got together and created funny skits to entertain the children. This would include dressing up and even throwing pies into each other's faces.


